


### A Trip That's Worth Packing For

What do you remember when you go on a trip, Rev. Dr. Trevor Brisbin asks in "Our North Star," a video that explains Humber Valley's new vocation, arrived at through a series of workshops and board discussions last October.



"I'm willing to bet that people remember the experiences,

sights and sounds of the trip, not the packing and preparing," Trevor notes. "There is so much to do from packing everything for a week into a carry on, and putting our toiletries in a zip lock bag."

Getting ready to travel takes a lot of work. "But when we do it, we're excited, we want to do it... because the tedious errands help us get somewhere better," Trevor says.

Churches are a lot of work too — including services, fundraisers, budget reports, and sometimes stressful interpersonal dynamics. But when we do all this, we are packing the right things to get where we want to go, he adds.

In October, Humber Valley looked at what it means to be a church in this post-pandemic world. There was a lot of time, work, and listening to Spirit to make sure we were hearing right. What emerged was Our North Star. "It's not a mission," Trevor said, "because a mission implies that completion is possible. It's more of a vocation we live with, a directional commitment. We are committed to living the gospel right here where we are."


In the same way Jesus embodies the Divine dream for the world, together, HVUC is seeking to be a living expression of justice, compassion & belonging now & into the future.

Throughout history, people have used the North Star to chart their course. So what is our North Star? The words at left are pretty straightforward. They say that HVUC is all in when it comes to following Jesus. Jesus exemplifies who we are — it all originates in Jesus. If you want to know what God cares about, Jesus is where you begin to look, Trevor said.

"What's the scariest thing you've ever done?" Trevor asks. And even though he sky dived for his 30th birthday, and has been bungee jumping twice, the scariest moment was on a recent Tuesday, and it involved his son's hockey team. For a number of years, Trevor has been manager of the team, handling all the off-ice things but never venturing onto the ice in his role. This year, he is still managing, but he is also one of the coaches, running drills and setting up power plays for the Under 16 A team (U16A).

Trevor admits that he has never played organized hockey! So last summer, he started reading books about hockey, immersing himself in a study of all things hockey.

"You can embrace and study a sport, but once you get on the ice, the experience is totally different. You have these massive players flying by at Mach 3. The energy and physicality of the game, the intensity is felt in your very bones.

"Jesus very quickly brings us physicality. Once you step into a life with Jesus, there is a mandate to make every decision in the way and heart of Jesus — and that hits differently. We had life with God and spirituality, but Jesus makes spiritual life a physical, tangible reality. What Jesus invites us into is inherently risky, and actually kind of dangerous."



With Our North Star, Humber Valley will live out the same values Jesus has. "Think of it. He was a guy born homeless, who was so committed to Justice and Compassion that his own religion and his own country conspired to get him killed," Trevor said.

North Star is not an organizational statement because it's scary. In the same way, Jesus embodies the divine dream for the world, Humber Valley United Church is seeking to be a living expression of Justice, Compassion and Belonging, now and into the future.

"After the hockey practice, i went for a walk with Marisol and our dog. She asked me about my first day on the ice. I didn't just have imposter syndrome — I was legitimately an imposter. But it was the right thing to do for our son. And on that Thursday night, our team won 8 to 5."

The hardest things in life often turn out to be the most rewarding things in life, Trevor says. "They bring us closer to a better version of ourselves.

"Our North Star will change many of the conversations that swirl around Humber Valley," he noted. "If we're doing it right, it's risky, not safe. We will be moving from 'what I want' to what really matters to live the life of Jesus. That's scary. Denying ourselves is a kind of crucifixion. Maybe with the right amount of faith and a certain degree of abandonment, Our North Star can lead us closer to the best versions of ourselves, now and into the future.

"Now that's a trip I'm willing to pack for."

#### From the Desk of the Chair of the Board





This is an exciting time for **Humber Valley United Church** as we reimage our guiding principle for the future of our church.

What is the North Star, both literally and metaphorically? The North Star, also known as Polaris, is located quite close to the point in the sky where the north rotational axis of the earth points – a spot called the north celestial pole. We can

see the stars in the night sky. As our planet rotates during the night, the stars around the pole appear to rotate around the sky. Over the hours, these stars each sweep out a circle around the celestial pole. The farther the star is from the pole, the larger the circle it travels around the sky.

The North Star is different. Because it is so close to the celestial pole, it traces out a very small circle over 24 hours so the North Star always stays in roughly the same place in

the sky and, is a reliable way to find the direction of north. The Anishinaabe call the North Star, the Returning Home Star.

Thus, the North Star, from a metaphorical perspective, is our personal or organizational directional statement – a direction you can depend on even as the world changes around you. It is a reference point to keep us moving in concert with the Spirit.

At Humber Valley, we began discussing our new direction, our North Star, in October of 2022. After a number of workshops and Board discussions with the ministerial team, we envisioned a direction we think is exciting and life renewing. It is now time for us to continue to co-create and reflect on where justice, compassion, and belonging exist in our church ministries already, and where the spirit is calling us for something new. You (the congregation and broad-church community) are an important part of this co-creation. The Board and I look forward to working with our ministerial team and you in this co-creation.



Following the example of Mary's Aunt Elizabeth, Humber Valley United Church becomes an extended family to newcomers. We hope to surround them with love, acceptance and the practical needs of their everyday lives

#### How do we structure our support?

- We take on one family at a time a family who does not have support in Canada and is struggling.
- We access their current needs and different members of the team take action:
  - o Filling out government forms
  - o Looking for housing
  - o Furnishing a home

- o Employment support
- Help determining which school is best if children are in the family
- o Shared meals
- Once the family is settled and stable for a month we take on another family.

#### What we are looking for

- An agency to partner with to give us families to support in a slow organized way so our Aunt Liz group doesn't get burned out.
- Volunteers that can help with searching for apartments for newcomers and sourcing furniture donations.
- Support from other churches in our fundraising efforts.

Yvan Baker Award for 2023 Lorraine Pearsall

Lorraine Pearsall is a wonderful example of a person sharing a special gift (and a lot of her time and resources) to enhance the life of her church and church community. For at least a decade she has used her imagination and decorator skills to make our "neutral" church hall pop.

Lorraine makes sure the hall is themed for winter, spring, Valentines, Easter, St. Patrick's, Christmas -- the list goes on. Special events like the monthly Daytimers luncheons, Remembrance Day, the Queen's Jubilee Tea, baby showers, are her inspiration. Her creations provide an atmosphere that strengthens and builds friendships, creating a welcoming environment where everyone knows they belong.

She has a large, organized cupboard where nothing is wasted; many items are recombined and brought out again. She works quietly and independently and always has a smile. Lorraine is an active member of United Church Women and was awarded the Fred Van der Vliet Award for Innovation in 2019.

Valley Voices has sung to great acclaim in many local senior's residences, at church events and at our Seasons of Love concert in June 2023. Colleen chairs the organizing committee in support of the paid choir director. She is the organizing force that keeps the choir together.



# Results for the full year ended Dec. 31, 2023 — Belonging

The table at right shows the financial results for HVUC for the full year ended December 31, 2023, with results to the end of December 2022 included for comparison purposes.

The church finished the full year of 2023 with a deficit of \$10,776. This compares to a deficit of \$133,072 in 2022, a positive swing of \$122,296 year over year. The deficit of \$10,776 is also better than the budget which forecasted a full year deficit of \$50,000.

The reduction in the deficit, year over year, was mainly achieved due to a reduction in expenses. Operating Revenue compared to prior year was lower by \$4,449 or 1%. While givings were down year over year, this was covered by stronger Fundraising and Use of church.

Expenses compared to prior year are lower by \$140,362 mainly due to savings in property with bringing custodian services back in house, offset by an increase in payroll costs for the custodians. Office and payroll expenses were also lower in 2023.

A lot of effort has gone into reducing the deficit year over year, with significant reductions in expenses.

Now we need to increase our givings for 2024. If you have not updated your PAR givings for 2024, it is not too late. You can still send an updated 2024 PAR to Finance.

### News from Humber Valley Groups

#### The Work of Stephen Ministry at Humber Valley — Compassion

Since 2017, Humber Valley United Church has been providing spiritual help and compassion to many people in our congregation and beyond through the work of a team of trained lay volunteers called Stephen Ministers. The impetus to bring Stephen Ministry to Humber Valley was led by Joanne Stenerson in 2016. Joanne, Lynn Manning, Mary Moffat Johansson and Rev. Mark Winger attended a Stephen Leaders training session in Pittsburgh that year led by full-time Stephen Ministry staff.

Following their return to Toronto, our Humber Valley Stephen Leaders led an in-house fifty-hour training program for four members of our congregation who became volunteer Stephen Ministers in 2017. They were Andrea Ostvik-Van der Vliet. Deborah Turnbull, Judith and David Dallimore. Later, Barbara Clarke and, Genvieve Bailey received Stephen Minister training and, more recently, Anne Pietropaolo, Brian Goodman and Licia Meldrum have received training sessions led by our in-house Stephen Leaders. We are also pleased that David Lang, a previously trained and seasoned Stephen Leader, has joined our Humber Valley Stephen Ministry team. Andrea Ostvik-Van der Vliet, Brian Goodman, David Dallimore, David Lang, Deborah Turnbull, Licia Bryden and Lynn Manning are currently active Stephen Ministers.

Over the course of the program being available at Humber Valley, 20 people have been positively helped by our Stephen Ministers through this program, which provides one-on-one in-depth pastoral care. Stephen Ministers are assigned to care receivers. Typically, care receivers are people who are feeling rather overwhelmed by a particular situation who need caring support and may be referred by the Minister or through contact with our two Stephen Leaders, Lynn Manning or David Lang.

Most Stephen Ministers meet once a week, one-on-one, with their carer receivers for about an hour at a time, often at the care receiver's home. They may also check in with the care receiver by phone or e-mail particularly when the care receiver may be going through a difficult time. There is no pre-set time limit on the care received from a Stephen Minister. Some caring relationships might last a month, others might last a year or more depending on the needs of the care receiver.

Stephen Minsters care by listening, supporting and encouraging, praying, being dependable and trustworthy while

maintaining strict confidentiality. Stephen Ministers keep personal information confidential so that care receivers can feel free to share with their Stephen Minister without worrying that anyone else will know about it.

Examples of the kinds of situations through which members of our congregation have received care include loss of a spouse or close friend, long-term illness of a family member, the impact of a partner developing dementia, family-related tensions impacting negatively on the care receiver, work related issues, adverse financial situations.

In all situations Stephen Ministers are trained to listen, to be empathetic, not to make rash judgements and to walk with their care receivers in an unhurried way to fully understand their particular and unique situations. They provide a compassionate non-judgemental listening ear. When appropriate, Stephen Ministers may offer prayer and sometimes encourage their care receiver to pray with them.

While confidentiality is a critical part of the program, the Stephen Ministry team does meet regularly as a peer supervision review group whereby each Stephen Minister reports on their activities and gains the benefit of input and suggestions from fellow Stephen Ministers. However, names of care receivers are not shared in order to maintain full confidentiality.

# Outreach Opportunities included Water, Gifts & Soup — Justice

HVUC Outreach continues to share opportunities for the congregation to learn about and contribute to local and international charities. We are a generous church.

Our Advent focus on Water for Life resulted in donations of \$1,300 to GAIN International for building wells in Africa. Humber Valley has contributed to more than 20 wells in Tanzania and Benin over the past 15 years.

Some people opt for anonymous entries with very little detail while others include the names and more detail about the situation that requires prayer. If the request is for someone other than yourself, please ensure the person reviews the text and gives their permission to share it with the Prayer Group. Then forward the information to Nancy Roper for distribution.

Although the entries are not marked confidential, the Prayer Group members know that the information is only to be used for prayer and caring.

We follow-up every few months to check how the person is doing and inquire whether they still need our prayers.

Just in time for Valentines Day Humber Valley was treated to a great concert by master violinist, Anton Yeretsky and superb pianist and story teller, Robert Hennig.


