Jonah's story, has something to say to you/us.





The next edition of Connections will feature our 70<sup>th</sup> Anniversary. We love to hear from you. Please send your comments and suggestions to Susanne or Colleen.



### Stewardship Report

The table at right below shows detailed financial results for HVUC to the end of July 2022. Results to end of July 2021 are included for comparison purposes.

At the Annual General Meeting in April 2022, the congregation approved the 2022 operating budget which forecast an annual operating deficit of \$125,000. You will note that the deficit as at this July has already exceeded the full year forecast at \$129,000 and is also significantly more than last year. To fund this deficit, the Trustees have transferred \$115,000 to Humber Valley United Church.

Congregational givings and Use of Church are not the primary issue.

Use of church has increased from last year with the church now open again after COVID. The increase in Use of Church is offset by the loss of COVID-19 grants which were substantial in 2021. Funds Available for Church Operations are more or less in line with last year.

The primary issue is on the expenses side.

There are major increases in YTD expenses, which exceed expenses of 2021 by \$128,000. Payroll and building expenses are higher than last year. Building expenses were budgeted to increase this year since the cost of the outsourced cleaning contract was reallocated to the area with the retirement of Zoran. In addition, a water leak from a valve by the furnace generated a water bill in April that was many times larger than our typical consumption. The leak was located and repaired so excess water consumption should not reoccur.

Without significant changes to income and/or expenses over the next few months, the year end deficit will be much higher than forecast.

It is already more than one hundred thousand dollars higher than this time last year!

However, you, the congregation have been highly supportive in the past when faced with financial challenges and I am confident that history will repeat itself.

Fall is coming quickly and is a time when many of us will return to church from cottages and travel.

Please remember to keep your giving levels up. If you are not physically at church, please remember to send your cheque either by mail or by dropping it in to the office at your convenience. You can also e-transfer your donation to Humber Valley United Church using the email address finance@hvuc.ca.

As always, sincere thanks to all of you for your continued support of HVUC.

This year is certainly presenting a financial challenge as we continue on our transformational journey together.

munity surrounding HVUC with pop ups on the lawn. Our pop ups with activities such as campfire sing along in West Deane Park and Paint Day with Licia on the lawn definitely were a hit and we learned a lot for planning future pop up events.

Over the summer we were able to reach out to other organizations serving seniors in the community

and we're thrilled to introduce three new partnerships that we're developing! The Centre for Aging and Brain Health Innovations (CABHI) will be sharing some of our programs with their national network and will present to

us at Daytimers in November to tell us about their innovative work on seniors issues.

We are also excited to be building a partnership with Just Like Family homecare services with our virtual programs being shared nationally and caregiver training sessions in the works!

Finally, we are extending our care kits and partnership to the foodbank Room to Grow at Westway United Church. Each month we'll be providing practical items to support more seniors living in the community. We'll also look at how we can collaborate on some fun intergenerational activities such as crafts and Storytime for young families.

As we head into the fall season, we've got a wonderful line up of programs planned. We are especially pleased to be able to hold our first in person Daytimers in over two years! On Monday September 26 we're going to celebrate with a luncheon party in Steed Hall. Valley Voices will be performing songs from the musical Godspell, we'll have

Almost a decade ago, Laureen Kinnear met a lady in Florida who invited her to attend a quilt group meeting. Laureen hesitated, so the lady said "We talk, have lunch and sew". Laureen decided to try it out and LOVED IT!

She can't imagine going back to regular sewing now – she adores all the fabrics and patterns and colours in quilting. She helped the quilting group make multiple quilts for needy children in Florida and has now made a regular quilt for each of her children and grandchildren and each bedroom at the cottage. She has made 25 "Table Topper" mini-quilts that adorn the tables in the café at Dorothy Ley Hospice throughout the seasons of the year and approximately 50 "Lap Quilts" for the seniors at Mabelle Arts.

When Laureen heard that Humber Valley was going to host a refugee family with a little girl, she knew just what to do! She wanted Hania to have something special, just for herself, that would make her feel welcome in Canada. Laureen made the most beautiful single bed quilt for Hania. She chose pink because "all little girls love pink" but added in a little mauve and a little purple since "girls like those colours as they get a little older".

When all the piecing was done, Laureen visited a lady out Burnhamthorpe way who has a giant quilting machine in her basement — together they selected a lovely daisy design for the quilting. Since we weren't sure how quickly our refugee family would arrive, Laureen asked if the quilt could be prioritized and the quilting lady was happy to do so. Laureen also made a decorative pillow case to match. She then pondered a doll but decided that all her kids preferred stuffed animals, so she bought what she thought was a teddy bear and made a matching quilt for the beast. Laureen added an inscription on the back of the quilt that says:

"When you sleep under this quilt, you sleep under a blanket of love.

Hania, this quilt was made especially for you and made with love.

Sylvia Cohen, from the refugee committee, presented the quilt to Hania at the end of August. She shared the following update:

"The family was very surprised to receive such a lovely gift and could not believe that Laureen had made it especially for Hania. Hania posed like a little model as you can see in the photos. She was hugging and snuggling the bear until we saw it has a pouch! We think it is a kangaroo! The pouch will be a perfect hiding place for candy!

I had a lovely visit with them: they are very hospitable and kind. They are looking forward to coming to church on September 18th for the BBQ."

Thank you, Laureen, for your wonderful idea to do something so notable for Hania. That was a huge investment of time and I know that it will be a treasure for Hania and her family – I hope they will pass it down from generation to generation.

### **Coincidences in Atlantic Canada**

It's quite amazing that during two separate holidays spent in Atlantic Canada Judith and I unexpectedly met Humber Valley United Church folk.

A few years ago, we decided to spend a holiday in Newfoundland. We had a wonderful trip and fell in love with the province and its people.

During this trip we spent a few days visiting Gros Morne National Park located on the western side of Newfoundland. We especially wanted see Western Brook Pond, a spectacular inland fjord which can be viewed from a small tour boat which traverses the length of this glacier-carved land-locked fjord. ### Youth and Young Adult Program Summer 2022

What an exciting summer it's been! Despite vacations, summer jobs and much needed R and R time Humber Valley Youth had continued to thrive!

Before summer break began we made Chilli for the Youth in residence at YWS and had a blast cooking together! We plan to do this more often in the fall!

We spent a day at the R.O.M. exploring the indigenous cultures exhibit and learned just how far back colonialism has been harming the first Nations in North America. We discussed awareness being the first step in changing the racism that has seeped into the foundations of our country. It was a very enlightening experience.

Over the summer we hired Cam Brubacher as our intern for Youth, Family and Young Adult programing and with his help provided bi monthly pop ups with crafts, games and fun for grade school aged children. We had rainbow mosaics, bubbles, bathtub boats and of course, colouring! We used the model of our successful Family Fun Fair to create stations for each activity. Our Fun Fair raised money for a great organization called Artscan Circle which provides artistic opportunities for Indigenous youth and we were thrilled to partner with them for this event.

Continuing our investment in Youth Without Shelter, we hosted a workshop with them to learn not only about the scope of what the organization provides and how it impacts the community, but also statistics about homeless youth in Toronto and dispelling some of the misinformation about their situation and circumstances. This inspired us to renew our efforts to partner with this organization in every way possible in the coming year.

We had a very successful intergenerational paint day hosted by Anne and the 55+ Program! I was pleased to again contribute by walking the group through a step by step paint instructional and the feedback received was all positive! We hope to schedule many more of these events as a great way to integrate all age groups together!

Through some research and elbow grease I compiled a list of all the United churches I could find in Toronto and their contact information to attempt a refresh of the networking that began several years ago but had to be set aside during COVID. I've garnered interest with several more congregations than were on the initial cluster list and am excited for further integration of our programs when possible!



In addition to this goal, I am introducing a new curriculum and model this fall for youth group which has been renamed L.I.F.T. (Learning in Faith Together). We will follow Trevor's sermon series along with him and open the youth room (which the youth have dubbed "The Bunker") after service each week to encourage more youth engagement in Sunday services. We will still have a youth group

meeting in the evenings weekly that will be more structured, post service get together will be more drop in style.



Young Adult gatherings will become more regular! Once a month we will alternate between an offsite gathering and a drop in at The Bunker! We are still feeling out how the

structure of the group will work but we are planning some fun activities for the fall including a public powwow and a karaoke night! We have named the YA group "Rooted" as our focus will be on getting ourselves ground-



ed to contribute to our communities and families from a place of strength, faith and assurance. Rooted will be group led and I am present as more of a faculty advisor than anything.

The formation of this group has triggered a change in my title and slight modification of my contract as the "Young families" moniker was confusing people due to a seeming



overlap between Claire and my roles. I will still provide family events once or twice a year (for example our upcoming bake sale to benefit our newcomer family from Afghanistan!) but my title (as approved by Trevor) has changed to Director of Youth and Young Adults. The majority of the young family networking and support is done through the context of JAM and the nursery program.

This summer has been such an opportunity to explore new avenues and methods, mentorship opportunities and of course, extensive networking! I'm excited for the fall and the opportunities these changes have created!

### SUMMER of 2022

The Summer of 2022 was an "almost back to normal summer".

Many masks came off, people gathered indoors again, many people had mild cases of COVID, families gathered at cottages, and travel resumed.

Here are some stories about

### **Bountiful Blessings**

I was fortunate to spend most of August at a cottage 8 hours drive north of Toronto. No TV, radio, or Wi-Fi ....... but thousands of acres of lakes, trees, and

### WILD BLUEBERRIES!



Although a scarcity in most areas of southern Ontario, "North of the Watershed" (where rivers flow to James Bay) the crop was truly bountiful this year.

It's wonderful to pick handfuls around the cottage to add to your breakfast cereal every morning, but where we like to really pick is "in the bush" on Crown land. The soil is very sandy with stands of cedar trees

waiting to be harvested. After the trees have been cut and the logs removed, the sun and rain can get to the low berry bushes amid stumps and piles of brush. Pickers use logging roads to access favourite (often secret) patches far inroad from the highway and travel by pickup trucks, ATVs, or other 4-wheel drive vehicles over the rough terrain. We park on the crest of a hill so always able to keep our vehicle in sight and to check out our surroundings as we ARE in bear country! We also pick in groups as it's easy to stray and lose your bearings with few landmarks in the bush.

Fashion options for blueberry picking are usually light-coloured, long-sleeved tops (the light colour helps to keep black flies away) and long pants with running shoes and socks - clothing you don't mind getting berry-stained.



This year we tried plastic and metal "claws" to assist with picking. Although these make for faster picking, it's harder to pick "clean" so you must spend longer at the table later separating out leaves and stems. Lightweight plastic pails are used to collect the berries and to transport

them back to the cottage and eventually to the city.

All in all, it was a wonderful August activity and although we eat many handfuls of fresh berries while we're up north, the rewards of frozen wild blueberries to put into muffins, oatmeal and pancakes throughout the Toronto winter, more than makes up for any discomfort from bug bites, muscle aches, and stained fingernails.



With all the berries we picked this year, I welcome any recommendations of recipes using blueberries that I can try.

It is not just the tourists who hang out at City Hall. One young woman was lounging on a bench looking at her phone right next to the pool. I can't explain the buildings in the water.




Kids love the Toronto sign.

Most of my golfing is done with my husband Gord and we have enjoyed many games together both here and when we travel.







My house has a covered porch looking out onto the back

yard. It's my favourite place to sit and reflect. The treed yard could be a cottage property in the middle of the city. The birds, and of course the chipmunks and squirrels, offer no end of entertainment. When I think about the future with the possible need to move to a condo or retirement home, I know that I would miss this place where I now relax and



feel a part of "God's wondrous world". A few years ago I listened to one of HVUC's recorded Sunday services while sitting on the porch in the evening. Hearing an inspirational message while watching the night sky had an impact that was hard to describe.

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




### **Vision Statement**
